President's Report



2015/16 has been another colourful and successful year in the life of the Devils, both in and out of the water.

As you'll see in these pages, 30 teams represented Drummoyne – ranging from juniors and seniors, to National League. A common theme across the board was our commitment to improving our game as well as enjoying ourselves – with different teams focusing on each end of the spectrum to varying degrees.

One of the aspects of which I'm most proud is how the Devils cater to people who choose to play at any standard: from beginners to seasoned players, from those who like to play for fun and fitness to those who aspire to the highest representative level.

On this latter point, around the time this report is published, we'll have three of our own heading to Rio as part of the Games of the XXXI Olympiad.

A hearty congratulations to Aidan Roach (in his second Olympics), and Mitch Emery and Tyler Martin (their first) who will proudly wear the green and gold for Australia. To have three Devils in the Olympics is truly remarkable, and made all the more special by the fact that all three played for the Devils from a very young age. Everyone in the Drummoyne community is very proud of you and wishes you and the Aussie Men's Team every success. We also acknowledge Jayde Appel who was part of the Aussie Stingers squad and who represented Australia extensively throughout the year.

Fiona Walsh was in the Australian Women's Uniroos team that won gold at the World University Games and she was also part of the Australian Junior Women's team. James Smith was in the Australian Junior Men's team, and Alex Corbett and Morgan Baxter toured to Japan as part of an Aussie Stingers 2020 Tokyo Development Squad.

In summary, 20 of our players were named in Australian squads or teams

during the year. Almost all these players got their start in water polo through our Junior Development Program.

At State level, 12 players were selected in State based school representative (i.e. CIS, CCC or CHS) squads or teams, and many won medals in their respective competitions. Jack Rector, Emma Jones and Carla Traplin were selected in the NSW All Schools teams. Jack and Carla were also selected in the Australian All Schools teams. Again, the vast majority of these players started among our junior ranks.

We had 55 U14 through to U20 players vying for State team selection. From these players 9 U14, 11 U16 and 5 Juniors were selected to play for NSW at either ECC or Pan Pacific Games.

Well done to the big list of Devils who were named in representative squads and teams throughout the year. You can find a summary at the end of the Annual Report.

SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

The Sydney Summer Metro Comp had 22 competitions, and we put 26 teams in the water. Of these, 18 made the semis and we won gold in 6 comps and were runner up in 5. Overall our ladies teams won 3 gold and 2 silver – and the men 3 gold and 3 silver. We finished in third place in 3 comps, and fourth place in 6. A fantastic result with over 75% of our teams finishing in the final four. Of particular note was the success of our L1 team being Ladies 1st Division Club Champions for the first time in our history. Congratulations!

And a special shout out to our L2 Black and L3 Red on their fourth premiership in a row.

We were also thrilled that our men's National League teams made the finals series – a fantastic result! Our men's team finished in fifth and our ladies finished 7th overall.

Congrats to our L16As who won silver @ Nationals, our L18 who won silver at State, our M16 Red who won bronze at State and our M20s who won bronze at the Col Smee State Championships.

SOCIAL EVENTS

Over the year, we hosted 13 events that continued to build the camaraderie our club is famous for.

These included the Red Ball, Life Members Lunch, Golf Day, Buddies Night, Back to Drummoyne Day, Derby Day, Steven Large Shield, Devils on Deck Harbour Cruise, Presentation Night and National League season launch.

Special mention must be made of

the Red Ball in March 2016 – this was a massive undertaking and I thank chief organiser Nicola Murphy, along with James Brennan, Tracey Mirabito, Cheryl Jones and Frances Watson who steered it to become such a huge success, both financially and socially.

Many hundreds of people participated across all of our events and the Devils' spirit was definitely alive and well at each!

JUNIOR DEVELOPMENT

Sponsored by Birkenhead Point Outlet Centre, our Junior Development Program has now inducted more than 1,400 juniors into water polo in its 15-year history. A huge thanks to Mark Simpson for his work organising the program, Paul Patrick for running the BBQ, Steph Patrick for looking after the bar, and to Fran Simpson who helped extensively behind the scenes, and to the other volunteers and players who assisted by coaching each week.

THANK YOU

A big thank you to the 100+ volunteers who help out in some way throughout the season, and who make it possible for our club to fulfill its many and varied responsibilities. 


Music was courtesy of James Smith's big brother, Cameron, and we were pleased to be able to thank our many sponsors, and to welcome back many familiar faces as the party continued.

Junior Development



This year we made some minor adjustments to the JDP format compared to previous seasons, based on feedback

from parents and children in previous years.

- We split the program into 2 separate 10 week terms, aligning with school terms 1 and 4 each year.
- We started the program half an hour earlier at 6.30pm
- We focused more on playing games, whilst still ensuring that the children were provided with skills development and specific water polo training exercises.

We are always open and receptive to feedback on the changes introduced this season, and we will be sending out a survey to obtain feedback on how we can continue to improve our junior development program. Men's Water Polo



I begin my report with the very exciting news of having three Devils in the 2016 Men's Olympic Team.

This is a fantastic achievement for Aidan Roach, Mitch Emery and Tyler Martin personally, and we are tremendously proud that three out of thirteen members of the National Team hail from our club. Well done AJ, Mitch and Tyler, your families, your coaches and everyone who has assisted you in this journey.

Back home, the Drummoyne men's program enjoyed another successful season with only 4 of our 15 teams missing the play-offs.

We ended up with 3 premierships (M16Bs, M4 and M7), gold and silver in the M7 and silver medals also in M3 and 16A. Another stellar performance in and out of the pool for the men's side of the club.

The junior boy's teams had a mixed year, the standout being our 16B's who won gold in the metropolitan competition and the 16As who while not winning anything, show great promise.

Our other teams, while competitive at times, struggled against the top sides and we know we need to refocus on developing our junior ranks. The club is currently going through a rebuilding phase in the juniors after a number of years of record numbers in all ages. To this end, we are focusing on JDP and running elite development camps to strengthen our junior playing base.

Our second division teams were

again boosted this year by a number of juniors. All the men's teams benefitted from a sprinkling of young, strong legs to do the swimming, allowing our senior statesmen time to think their way around the pool. This combination of youth and experience is a great benefit to both the club, by boosting our playing strength, but also to the players, ensuring the young ones continue to develop and the seniors keep playing polo for the sheer enjoyment of the sport.

Our emphasis of combining youth and experience was showcased in the stand out grand final of the year in M7 where Youngy's team took on Muz's kids. While Muz's team got the cash on the night, it might have been a very different story if the officials hadn't made the old blokes play in a 30m pool. Our other highlight was Simmo's M4 side finally beating their nemesis from Cronulla. This was a win 12 years in the making and celebrated in typical Drummoyne fashion at the Oxford Hotel.

M3 again came close but couldn't get over the line in the grand final. The dream team again dominated the season but the goals dried up when it counted in the last quarter of the final, losing to Wests by a goal. Generally our first division teams lacked player numbers to be competitive every week, something we need to focus on next season. M1 and National League this year could both be summed up by "if only". M1 lost their Semi Final by a goal with a missed 5 metre penalty. If only we had converted that opportunity. National League were even more unlucky going down in penalty shoot-out in the finals to eventual winners UWA. Between the ball bouncing the wrong way off the woodwork and the referee denying us a fair goal it just wasn't our day. If the game was played another 10 times we would win it every time, again if only.

Petar Petrovic again excelled in his second year as Head of Coaching, fulfilling not just the national league and M1 coaching roles but also mentoring all the club's coaches to ensure our juniors are taught the skills to allow them to continue to develop not just for the club, but the many representative roles fill by players from Drummoyne

SECOND DIVISION

Anna Corry and Leanne Costantino took on the responsibility of managing/coordinating the L5 team. Their efforts saw numbers grow and the team achieved a semifinal position. We look forward to continued improvement in this team next summer.

Lora Cipriani manages/coordinates/ coaches the L4 team. Lora's tireless efforts with this team have seen an increase in numbers and a huge improvement in results to narrowly lose the final. A grand final position must surely await next year.

JUNIORS

Our entry level team L14B was this year coached by Club stalwarts Fraser Foristal and Mark Simpson. They are a very young team which showed marked improvement over the summer and will no doubt put up a strong performance in the summer to come. Fraser and Mark are already plotting their development over the winter period.

The 14As were again coached by Lora Cipriani who was this year assisted by Kate Mackarell as manager. Laura and Kate put in a huge effort throughout the summer which saw the team steadily improve to the point where it achieved an 11th placing in the National Championships.

The 16Bs were coached by Jenny MacGregor and managed by Leanne Costantino. The team had a very successful summer making their way to Metro Comp Grand Final where, in a see-sawing and very tight game they lost by one goal.

The 16Bs are a young team and we look forward to strong performances from these girls as they continue in the 16's for the summer to come.

The 16A's were also coached by Jenny MacGregor and were managed by Steve Traplin. This team is also in the development phase and has shown improvement throughout the summer. Jenny has a big program worked out for the team over the



winter period as they move towards the National Club Championships with the hope of achieving good results. If Jenny's enthusiasm for this team is a guide, we can expect a strong performance in the Nationals.

The L18s were coached by Michael Hahn and managed by Cheryl Jones. The team had a strong summer finishing fourth in the Metro Championships, second in the State Championship and fourth at the Nationals. Many of this team are eligible to play L18 again next summer and we can expect a strong showing.

The bulk of our under 18 team, combined with a number of older girls, once again competed in the Col Smee (under 20s) tournament. The Club had previously competed in five straight finals in this tournament and the girls had a very hard act to follow.

The tournament results indicated what a strong age group this is and unfortunately the girls finished out of the medals.

I thank Michael Hahn for taking on the role of coaching the team. I'm sure we will return to the winners' circle in this tournament soon as the bulk of this year's team will be eligible again next year.

NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

The Under 14A team recently returned from a successful campaign at the Under 14 National Championships. As noted above, the team achieved 11th placing. Importantly, the team drew with All Hallows during the rounds -All Hallows went on to win the Championship and become National Champions.

Nine of the twelve players who represented the Club at the Under 14 National Championships are eligible are to do so again next year and we look forward to some very strong performances from this team in the summer to come. Macy Hansford was named in the tournament team.

The Under 18 National Championships concluded on 16 April 2016. The team finished fourth after qualifying on top of their championship pool. They were defeated in the semi finals by eventual National Champions Melville from Western Australia and met Sydney Northern Beaches in the bronze medal game. The team had defeated Sydney Northern Beaches in the pool rounds by one goal. In the bronze medal game they weren't able to repeat that performance and lost by 2.

The Under 18s Nationals was a very strong competition. Any of the top four teams could have won. Emma Jones, Savannah Henshaw and Emma Workman stayed on in Perth after the conclusion of the Championships for a Born 98 National Camp.

NATIONAL LEAGUE

The Women's National League will be the subject of a separate report by our National League Women's Captain, Breanna Appel. I will leave it to Bre to provide the details of the National League season.

The National League team, like L1, was coached by Zoli Ridzyk and managed by Tracey Mirabito. The



team finished 7th on the competition table, one place out of the finals.

In National League, Zoli was aided by Michael Hahn as the assistant coach. I thank Zoli, Michael and Tracey for their efforts with the team. We are all aware the season was fitted into a tight schedule to match men's and women's National Camps which posed difficulties for the coaches, manager and players. I thank all involved for the effort they made to ensure their availability in periods when we might otherwise have expected a short break from water polo.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

I once again record my thanks to all coaches and managers. We could not complete in any competitions without the time and effort the coaches and managers put in. The professional manner in which all coaches and managers go about their jobs never ceases to amaze me. Their passion for the club and the teams they coach and manage is obvious to all.

Cheryl Jones has again performed the role of Junior Coordinator. This position is a key link between senior and junior women's water polo and Cheryl's extensive knowledge of protocols of our touring teams is a huge asset to our junior managers and coaches. Thank you Cheryl.

Last year I thanked Peter Corbett who works as our logistics expert. He has again performed that role and more importantly done all of the hard work in setting training rosters and organising pool time. With 12 women's teams and the National League team ensuring each has adequate training time and a pool in which to play each week is a difficult task which Peter seems to perform with ease. Thank you Peter.


I wish to thank parents, players and

Inspired by the capability offered by RevolutioniseSport, in February we migrated our website to its platform.


This enabled us to centralise key functions (for example, news, registrations, events, merchandise, team communications and more) all in one place.

Well done Jenny!






Vale Cole Miller



Next up, we played the team that ended up losing the GF by one goal. Although we lost 18-0, there was a sense that the girls were starting to understand.

At that point we had conceded 56

goals and scored 10.

We told the girls to remember these games, as the memory would serve them well as they improved over time. Water polo is not a sport that is learnt fast or from a book.

As the Xmas break approached, the girls were training well and progressing slowly but surely.

With minds on all things festive, against a team below us on the table, we took our eyes off the ball in the last game before Yuletide, and were thumped in a disappointing effort. Coach needed a good lie down.

Despite the lop sided win/loss record, the girls never lost their enthusiasm for playing or training. They did give the Coach needed perspective.

Our results in the second half of the season didn't accurately reflect the amount of resolve they showed or the amount they improved.

Over the course of the season, we lost three players, as their other



commitments became too large for their families to juggle.

Two of those girls were of the five who had previously played, so it placed greater responsibility on the other three but also meant that others had to fill the void.

That was done admirably by girls like Sophia Zorzi, who blossomed as the season wound on. From a girl who, despite her swimming ability, was very timid before the break, yet scored a hat trick in our second last game of the year.

Another example was Jemma Gilligan. Plucked from JDP, despite her dislike of swimming, we decided she would make a great goalie. And so it was. With improved throwing, she will become a very capable shot stopper.

Cara Parker is further demonstration of perseverance prevailing. She was a reluctant starter who, like Sophia, scored her first goal in our penultimate game, and hopefully that will spur her to realise her considerable potential.

After losing those aforementioned girls, it was with some relief that just before the Chrissie hiatus, we were fortunate to get a new player on board. Although slight of frame, Miah was a pocket rocket, and despite her lack of experience, by season's end, had become part of our top five starting players. She will benefit greatly by playing a full season of Winter Comp.



The Metro comp had 8 teams from 6 clubs, with Sydney University and UNSW Wests entering 2 teams. First up was a road win over Cronulla. The HSC, illness and injury caused havoc prior to Christmas and our team list changed a LOT each week.

We managed easy wins against the Uni B teams and were able to manage wins over Balmain and Cronulla consistently. UNSW Wests gave the lads their first defeat, and it wasn't pretty. The boys rallied to draw with Sydney Uni's A team and to defeat Hunter prior to Christmas. Jack Rector and Matt Dembecki were consistent leaders in attack with Harry Gilkes and young 16's goalie Connor Wicks leading the defence.

The team got through to Christmas with 1 loss and 1 draw and several close wins to be tied 2nd on the ladder. With the older players becoming available, the New Year held promise. First up, State Championships in mid-January. The timing conflicted with family trips and 3 of our best were away on holidays, and Jack Rector returned from India the night before! Our M16 boys filled the gaps and despite some close games, our tired mob (playing their 8th game in 3 days) lost the 5th placed playoff to a team they beat on day 1.

The resumption of Metro saw an improving Devils outfit take on UNSW Wests A (who won Silver at Nationals). Leading Sydney Uni by 2 in the 3rd, a disrespect call against us led to a 1 goal loss – and a 3 way tie for top spot. Count back rules made us 3rd seed for the semi-finals, having to



play Hunter (#2 seed for Nationals). The Devils lost that semi 10-11 in a quality game and Hunter went on to win the Metro. Thanks to coach Srdjan Maric who took the boys thus far.

With National League Finals in March, head coach Petar Petrovic took the team to Nationals in Perth in April. Water Polo Australia – trying a new structure – seeded teams prior, making game 1 a "must win" to go through to top 8.

Due to the 6th place at State Championships, our boys drew #2 seed, Hunter, in game 1. Despite great preparation, the boys started nervously and had to chase the game. They matched Hunter in the 2nd half, but lost. This forced them into the Bowl group to play for 9th. Our lads were disappointed, but went through the week winning their way to the Bowl Final against Sydney Uni and claiming the Bowl at the end of a long week in Perth, and a long summer of water polo.

It was a great club effort with so many of the 16's players helping out week after week – and 4 of them making the trip to Perth. Congratulations to Harry, Daniel, Chris, Rory, Matt and Jack who were all named in the NSW Junior Men State Squad at the end of the summer. Jack went on to earn Australian Schoolboys selection in May.

The Drummoyne Devils Women's Team started the 2015-2016 season with an historic success by winning the L1 Sydney Metro Competition. We had consistently good results throughout these games, only losing one game against Sydney Uni. Our semifinal vs. Balmain, which we won on penalties, was probably the hardest game. In the final vs. UNSW Magpies we had a brilliant start in defence leading the game at half time by 5-0 and securing the win in the end by 7-5. It was a great way to start the new season, and a solid platform to build on the upcoming National League season.

Then the start of the NL was a totally different experience. Our first game was played in the Dawn Fraser pool vs. Balmain and we lost 7-10 against a team we had beaten 3 times so far this season in the Metro comp. The refereeing was totally different than we'd been used to in the previous successful Sydney comp and we failed to adapt to the new approach during the game. The amount of turnover fouls against us was shocking: 21 and only 4 against Balmain... Before the competition started, I considered this Balmain game essential to achieve a good result in the end as our following games were away in Perth.

The road trip started with a hard fought draw (8-8) with UWA Torpedoes on Thursday night, that ended up a draw after penalties (11-11). We learned that night that Torpedoes this year is a much stronger side than previously. Our second game against them was a much better game, but we still lost 9-12 after losing our first CF Jayde Appel and main CB Bre Apple in the third quarter. In the games vs. Freo we showed our potential especially in the second game where we were leading 4-0 and 7-5 but being the fourth game of the trip we probably got tired and lost the game in the end 9-12.

Before the NL holiday break we had two more games (against Hunter Hurricanes), and we won both in a convincing manner. After these first seven games I really saw an improvement in the team. We started to integrate the two new players (Fiona and Jayde), who had not played in the Metro Comp. Their presence significantly changed the dynamics of the team and the responsibilities of different players within the game. I felt it's a big shame that we had the holiday break in December/January because we'd begun to pick up pace and have a better understanding as a team.

Our first game after this break was a rather disappointing 8-15 loss against Cronulla. I was disappointed not only because of the result – but more so because of our approach to the game. I felt like we forgot basic things and we need to recap them a.s.a.p. The next game was Balmain in Drummoyne and it was a great win (11-8), and we played very well. The team totally changed from the previous game and became much more positive; it was one of our best games this season. The next day we played UNSW Magpies where again we struggled in all aspects of the game, but won 6-5. The upside from this game was the fact that



we managed to win playing badly, and this was very important as it brought back our confidence and the possibility of qualifying for the finals!

Two very close losses against Sydney Uni (10-12) and Cronulla (9-12) showed that we can compete with the best teams of the comp. Actually I felt that these games were big opportunities we missed to gain some points and move closer to a final appearance. The following weekend Drummoyne hosted KFC Breakers and we won the first game in torrential rain 16-12. Defensively it was another weak game and unfortunately the defensive failure continued in the return match two days later. KFC held a 9-1 lead at half time and after getting ourselves together we could only minimise the damage, finishing 6-13 down. Another vital game lost, but the girls kept working hard and had a very strong encounter on the following weekend against Brisbane Barracudas. We forced the undefeated leaders of the championship into a very close game, losing by just 7-9 in the first game, but defeating them in the second game 9-6.

At this stage we were still in the race to occupy the last spot in the final series, but we needed to win all our games on our Victoria/Adelaide road trip. Unfortunately Victoria proved stronger than us in both games, but I was very proud of my team as they fought both games heroically to the end (8-12, 10-13).

After a short flight to Adelaide, we played two important games to secure at least our 7th spot on the ladder. We won 17-10 and 15-6 and I was again very pleased with the performance of the younger players, Savannah Henshaw, Emma Workman and Emma Jones.

In the last round of the season we

had two more games to play: 8-17 loss vs. Sydney Uni in their pool, defensively probably our poorest game; and a 9-8 win over UNSW Magpies. This last game was again a very good one, totally the opposite of the game vs. Sydney Uni. We played a disciplined game, and we deserved to win.

All in all I consider our season a positive one, with a great performance in the Metro Comp and lots of ups and downs in the National League. With a little bit more consistency and luck we could have easily reached the final series there too, and achieved a good result. I saw lots of improvements technically, tactically and physically among most of my players and the team as a whole, but I also believe there is still plenty to improve on. Learning from our mistakes and paying lots of attention to the details is essential in achieving these improvements.

Finally I would like to thank the whole Drummoyne National League Squad for their commitment and dedication this season. I also would like to thank Bre Appel and Morgan Baxter for their leadership in captaining the squad this year. Thank you both!

This season we had Eike Daube as

an import player from America, whom I would also like to thank. Her involvement was very important for this group and her performance was outstanding on most of the games throughout the season. On behalf of everyone involved with the Drummoyne Women's Water Polo Squad, thank you.

My biggest thank you is to Michael Hahn who assisted me in the coaching of the L1/NL Squad on every training session and game! His input was very important and his dedication to the sport and the Drummoyne Club is exemplary. Cheers Michael!
